Parental Perspectives on Delirium (P-POD)

Did your child with heart disease develop delirium?

Researchers from Nationwide Children's Hospital would like to hear from parents, grandparents, or caregivers of children with heart disease who observed their child with symptoms of delirium.



Symptoms of Delirium may include:

- Disorientation, confusion, agitation
- Problems with memory
- Difficulty speaking
- Easily distracted, inability to stay focused
- Getting stuck on an idea and not able to change focus
- Seeing, hearing or feeling things that aren't there (hallucinations)
- Fear or paranoia out of proportion
- Crying out, howling or making other distress sounds
- Unable to soothe with usual comfort strategies
- Decreased activity or unusually quiet and withdrawn
- Not making eye contact
- Disturbed sleep
- Extreme irritability
- Excessive irritability or anger
- Rapid and unpredictable mood shifts
